



Dating back to the early 1900's, this house can be appreciated for its lovely wood structure.

QUISENBERRY HOUSE






was owned by the Quisenberry family unit1 the 1980's.

This cemetery serves as the final resting place for 11 of McLean County's Civil War veterans, both Union & Confederate.



METHODIST CHURCH


Remodeled several times, this church was built in 1902 and is the oldest church in Livermore






## Stuenmone Walking Toun

Built around 1900, this building has served as a Union Hall, a saloon, a bank & a dentist office.



This building was built by Benjamin F. Quigg around 1900. It has been used as a general store, bank, post office, barbershop, and presently as a library.



Originally built in 1905 to house the Livermore Mercantile Company, the principal proprietor of the building has been




Known as the "Drummer House" because of the salesmen who found lodging there, this structure dates back to the 1800's and has continually been in the Henninger family.



SCOTT HOUSE

Perhaps the oldest house in Livermore, this home was built on land originally owned by Livermore's founder, William A. Brown.





OWEN-DEVER HOUSE

This original part of this house was built around 1827. It was constructed with square nails and has solid wood sheeting. It has been in the Owen family for five generations.
